

## James R. Crabb, Former **County Commissioner**, Dies At Age Of 97

Ill three weeks, James Robertson 'Crabb, native and life-Ing Jackson county resident, widely known in farming and political circles, and former county commissioner, died last Thursday at the Crabb home-place, three and one-half miles north of Brownstown, where he had lived since shortly after the turn of the century.

He was ninety-seven years old ast October. last

last October. Born on a farm, west of Sey-mour, now known as the Ed Grein farm, on October 4, 1861, six months after the outbreak of the Civil War, Mr. Crabb was a son of the late Cyrus Douglass and Mary Robertson Crabb. He was the last surviving member of his family, including two brothers, a half-brother and three half-sisters. On August 1 1895 he was

On August 1, 1895, he was married to Miss Ida Claycamp, member of a prominent family of the Surprise community and in 1908 they moved to the pre-sent Crabb homeplace. Mrs. Crabb died in 1939. For many years Mr

For many years Mr. Crabb managed his more than 500-acre managed his more than bou-acre grain farm and also had a large herd of Hereford cattle. In later years his sons joined in the farm management. A staunch Democrat, Mr. Crabb played an important part in county politics for many in A

in county politics for many years and served his party two terms as county commissioner

The terms and served his party two terms as county commissioner from 1921 until 1926. He was one of the original directors of the Jackson County REMC and served on the board for many years and also was active in the Brownstown Town-ship Farm Bureau. He was a member of the Sur-prise Methodist Church and for several years as a trustee of the Pleasant Grove Church, which is on the Surprise Cir-cuit and which he and his family attended due to its nearness to their home.

attended due to its nearness to their home. He was a member of Wash-ington Lodge No. 13, Free and Accepted Masons, of Brownstown, of Seymour Council No. 38, Roy-al and Select Masters and Sey-mour Chapter, No. 85, Royal Arch Masons.

Masons Mr. Crabb had a long and use-ful life and for many years was a dominant figure in the com-munity, working consistently for community betterment — better schools, better roads, better farming conditions—winning the admiration and respect of every-one who knew him. Surviving are five children, two sons and three ' daughters. They are Miss Faye Crabb, Miss Hazel Crabb and Miss Lillian Crabb, and Cyrus and Edward "Bud" Crabb, all at home. Funeral rites were held Sat-urday afternoon from the Zabel Funeral Home in charge of the Rev. Harold Claycamp, of Grand-view, Indiana, who is a cousin of the late Mrs. Crabb.
