

Mrs. C. Max Cribb, Brownstown, Dies

Mrs. Ruby Cribb, 60, wife of C. Max Cribb, secretary of the Brownstown Loan and Trust Company and a prominent Brownstown resident, died Friday night at the home in Brownstown. She had been ill for three and one-half years and had been seriously ill for more than a year.

Funeral services will be conducted at 2:30 o'clock (DST) Sunday afternoon from the Winklepleck Funeral Home, Brownstown, with the Rev. Walter N. Zenah, of Aurora, and the Rev. Robert Crosby, of Columbia City, former pastors of the Brownstown Presbyterian Church, in charge, Burial in Fairview Cemetery, Brownstown.
