Pfc. Davers Dies Of Wounds In Germany

Former Medora Soldier Had Been In Service Since January, 1942 — Had Served In Infantry In North Africa, Sicily, France And Germany.

Word was received by relatives Saturday that Pfc. Clyde Davers, age 31, died of wounds received in action in Germany on October 2. He was wounded on October 1.

Pfc. Davers had served with an Infantry division through North Africa, Sicily, France and Germany. After the battles in North Africa and Sicily he was sent to a rest camp in England, and participated in the invasion of France on D-Day, June 6.

He was awarded the Purple Heart medal for wounds received while in Algiers.

He entered the service January 19, 1942, and after receiving training in the States was sent overseas in October of the same year.

Before entering the service he was employed by Harry Haag, as a driver of the elephant truck for the Fishers Bros. Circus.

Deceased was born at Terre Haute August 27, 1913, the son of Thomas and Pearl Matlock Davers. He spent the greater part of his life in and near Medora, and attended the schools at Medora.

Besides his mother, Mrs. Pearl Elkins of Peoria, Ills., he is survived by a brother, Robert Davers of Freetown, and a sister, Miss Catherine Davers of Dallas, Texas, and a grandmother, Mrs. Nora Johnson of Norman.
