

Young B'town Father Meets Tragic Death

Danny Ray Delph, 20, Killed When Automobile Falls Off Jack Crushing Him. Rites Held Monday.

A' young Brownstown father of two small daughters, who would not have been 21 years old until next month met a tragic death shortly before 10:00 o'clock Saturday morning. Danny Ray Delph, who lived at 912 South Main street, was

Danny Ray Delph, who lived at 912 South Main street, was killed when a station wagon, under which he was working to remove a part, slipped off the jack and fell on him, crushing his chest.

The accident happened at the farm home of his parentsin-law, Mr. and Mrs. Raymon-Robison. The body was found by Mr. Delph's brother-in-law, Stanley Robison.

According to County Cororner Keith Burkholder, death was caused from suffociation, due to a crushed chest.

Funeral rites were held Monday afternoon from the Brownstown United Methodist Church, with services in charge of the pastor, the Rev. Staten E. Lightfoot, and the Rev. Clarence Killion, pastor of the Acme United Methodist Church. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery.

Mr. Delph was born October 19, 1950, in East Bernstadt, Kentucky, a son of Walter and Jean Allen Delph, who live near the Honeytown bridge. He moved to this area with his parents when two years of age.

On September 1, 1968, he was married in Brownstownto Gerda Elise Robison, who survives, as do the two small daughters, Richelle Lynre, two, and eightmonth-old Filise Leanne.

Also surviving are a broth-Randal Deipl, and two sistrs, Carolyn and Cheryl Deiph, at home.

He was graduated from Brownstown Central High School in 1958, and was employed at the Cummins Engine Company, Columbus, and was a member of the Acme United Methodist Church.
