Mrs. Findley Dies Sunday, Aged 80 Yrs.

Was Prominent In Religious, Social And Civic Affairs---Last of Family.

Findley—Mrs. Sarah C. Findley, who has been in a serious con-dition with a complication of diseases for the past two months, passed away at her home in Brownstown Sunday evening at 6:30 o'clock, aged 80 years

On Sunday night, February 13, 1927, while on her way to church, she was struck by an automobile. Her right hip was broken and she was otherwise injured. She had so far recovered that she was able to get around with the aid of a crutch until June 7, 1928, when she fell and fractured her hip the second time.
