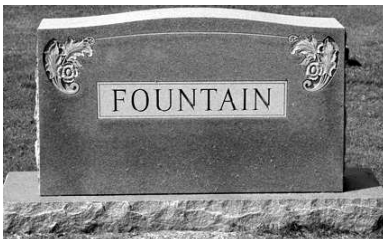

Mrs. V. H. Fountain Dies—Wife Of Ex-County Official

Mrs. Nora E. Fountain, wife of Virgil H. Fountain, who served as Clerk of the Jackson Circuit Court from 1924 until 1932, died at 2:00 o'clock Monday afternoon in Harris Sanitarium, Indianapolis.

She had been ill for three weeks and had been a patient in Indianapolis Community Hospital for two weeks. A week ago she was transferred to the Sanitarium.

Mr. and Mrs. Fountain lived at Lawrence, Indiana, moving there sixteen years ago.

A native of the Freetown community, Mrs. Fountain was born January 6, 1879, a daughter of the late Daniel H. and Sarah E. Forgey George.

She and Mr. Fountain were married at Kurtz on October 20, 1901, and went to housekeeping in Clearspring where Mr. Fountain assisted his father, the late John W. Fountain, in the Fountain General Store. Last October they celebrated their 61st wedding anniversary.

In 1907 they moved to Brownstown and in 1916 to a farm in Jennings county. Three years later they returned to Clearspring and in 1924 returned to Brownstown for residence, moving from here, in 1945 to Seymour, and then to Lawrence.

Prior to his election as county clerk in 1922, Mr. Fountain was employed in the Brownstown State Bank.

Mrs. Fountain was a member of the Emerson Avenue Baptist Church, Indianapolis.

Surviving, in addition to the husband are nine children. They are Hugh Fountain, of Lawrence; Mrs. James E. (Helen) Lockman, who lives on U. S. Highway 31 between Seymour and Columbus; Ross Fountain, of Prescott, Arizona; Mrs. Robert (Gladys) Terkhorn, of Battle Creek, Michigan; Oren Fountain and Ray Fountain, both residents of Indianapolis; Virgil Fountain, Jr., of Lawrence; Mrs. Max (Elizabeth) Simmons, of Evansville and Mrs. Ruth Jarbo, of Owensboro, Kentucky.

Also surviving are 17 grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Fountain, whose life was devoted to her family, possessed a quiet, friendly disposition which won her many friends in each community where she lived.
