HELLER—Henrietta C. Heller was born June 18, 1846, near Petersburg, Boone county, Ky., and died at her home near Brownstown April 17, 1910, aged 63 years, 9 months and 29 days. Her maiden name was Chapin.

She was united in marriage June 16, 1861, to William Fox, who soon after their marriage volunteered in the war of the late Rebellion and within two years was killed on the battlefield at Vicksburg. She then moved with her mother and sisters to Seymour, Ind., where she found employment as weaver in the Seymour woolen mills. She remained at this work six years or up to the time of her second marriage which occurred June 14, 1870, when she became the wife of Henry P. Heller, of this place. To this union were born four children, viz: Mrs. Mary N. Gloyd, of Franklin, Ind.; Ralph F., of Vallonia, and Miss Cora and Emil V. Heller, who live at home.

At the age of 12 years she united with the Methodist church and remained a member until death. She was very devoted to her home surroundings and always tried to make the home such that her children would love to be with her. Although afflicted for many years she was cheerful and patient to the last. Her death was calm and peaceful and her last words were full of bright assurances. She was ready to answer the summons cheerfully because she had perfect trust in God. In her early life she was very devoted to the church and Sunday school work and while at Seymour was teacher of the primary class in the M. E. Sunday school. Later when she became involved in family duties and her health began to fail she had to give up her church work but still clung to the faith and lived a pure quiet life. Honesty and straight forwardness were her marked characteristics. A good wife and mother has gone from us. Our loss in Heaven's gain.

Besides her husband and children she leaves three sisters—Mrs. Eliza Amick, of Ithica, N. Y.; Mrs. Mary Hutcheson and Mrs. Anna Reid, of Chicago, Ills. She also leaves one grandson, Master Ralph Gloyd.

The funeral services were conducted at the M. E. church Tuesday afternoon at two o'clock Rev. Edw. F. Schneider officiating, after which the remains were laid to rest in Fairview cemetery.
