

Lawson Huckleberry, Former B. & O. Crossing Watchman, Succumbs

Death came suddenly Monday morning to Lawson Huckleberry, a resident of Brownstown for the past half-century and for many years watchman at the Balti-more & Ohio Railroad crossing at Ewing.

· Mr. Huckleberry had been excellent health and on Sunday had been in Salem to attend funeral rites for a friend, and news of his death came as a shock to his many friends in

A native of Washington county, Mr. Huckleberry was born February 14, 1878, a son of the late John H. and Sarah Carter Huckleberry. He spent his boymanhood in the Salem community, moving Brownstown fifty years ago, and until his retirement a few years ago was a section employee of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad, and for many years watch-ed the crossing at the Ewing de-

He was married, in Washington county, on June 29, 1899, to Sarah A. Fleenor, who survives as does a son, Claude Huckleberry, of New Philadelphia, Washington county, and two daughters, Mrs. Clyde Knight and Mrs. Jessie Knight, both residents of Salem.
