Sudden Illness Takes Young Boy

**ERNEST GLEN McCLINTIC JR. DIES
THIS MORNING AFTER BECOM-
ING SICK AT SCHOOL**

Following a sudden illness which started about 10 o'clock Wednesday morning while at the Emerson school here, where he was a member of the 5th grade, Ernest Glen McClintic, 12-year-old son of Chief of Police Glenn McClintic, died at 9 o'clock this morning at the Bedford hospital, where he was taken about 12 o'clock last night.

Cause of death had not been definitely determined up to noon today. A coroner's inquest was to be held this afternoon at the Haverly mortuary, where funeral arrangements are being handled.

It is said that after becoming sick at school he went home, and remained there Wednesday afternoon with Mrs. Ethel McClintic. A local doctor was called shortly afternoon, but it is said that the boy's condition did not then appear to be serious. About 9 o'clock he grew worse, developed convulsions, and became unconscious. Immediate efforts were made to secure a doctor, but no one here, at Orleans or Bedford was available just at the time. Dr. G. G. Colglazier was then called, and arrived about 10:30. The boy was taken to the hospital, where he died this morning without regaining consciousness.

It was said at noon today that the funeral will be Sunday at 1 p. m. at the First Methodist church here, with the Rev. N. I. Schoolfield in charge. Burial will be in the Brownstown cemetery beside the mother, who passed away six years ago.

Ernest Glen was born March 22, 1929 to Glenn and Bertha Holman McClintic at Brownstown. The family moved to Mitchell soon after he was born, and the remainder of his life was spent here. He became a member of the Methodist church last December, and was also a member of the Mitchell Boy Scout troop. In church, school, and among his many friends, he was a very popular and well-liked boy, with friendly, pleasing disposition.

Survivors are the father; the step-mother, Mrs. Ethel McClintic; three half-brothers, Howard, Norris and Dale McClintic, of Columbus; a half-sister, Miss Peva Sage of Brownstown; the paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter McClintic of Newbern; the maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Logan Holman of Brownstown; an uncle, Wayne McClintic of Mitchell; and an aunt, Mrs. Howard Barnes of Chicago.
