lerry McOsker Dies Suddenly

The sudden death of Jerry Mc-Osker of Brownstown Friday morning came as a distinct shock to his many friends. Death was due to a heart attack. Although he had been in ill health for some time, he was able to be up and about the house. Mrs. McOsker had started to come down in town, but before leaving she went back in the room where Mr. McOsker was and found him dead.

Funeral services, in charge of the Rev. Father Charles McSween, assistant pastor of the St. Ambrose Catholic church in Seymour, were conducted at the home Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Burial in Fairview cemetery.

Mr. McOsker was born in Brownstown township May 16, 1866, to John and Matilda Mc-Osker and was reared to manhood on the homestead farm. On November 27, 1901, he was married in Seymour to Miss Blanche Branaman of Brownstown.

In politics Mr. McOsker was a staunch supporter of the Democratic party. He served two terms as sheriff of Jackson county from 1909 to 1913.
