

Mr. Nuss retired on August
31, 1967 after a career of over
49\_years as an employe of
Public Service Indiana, with the Public Service Indiana, with the last 42 years of that service as manager of the Brownstown PSI office. Only 16 years of age when he began working in 1918 for Interstate Public Service Company as an errand boy, he later served as a meter reader, truck driver, groundman, lineman, line foreman, brakeman on the traction line and worked on change-over line and worked on change-over at North Vernon prior to be-ing advanced to manager of the Brownstown office seven years later.

Manager In 1925 Mr. Nuss on July 1, 1925, became the first manager of the Brownstown office after the Brownstown office after Public Service purchased prop-erty from Brownstown Water and Light Company.

Always interested in the ef-fort to combat, detect and con-

trol tuberculosis, Mr. Nuss was an active member of the board of directors of the Tuberculoof directors of the Tuberculo-sis Association of Jackson County, Inc., a post in which he had served since 1941. He had served several times as an officer of the county association and had been a volun-teer worker for the association since 1937

Elected a member of the board of directors of the In-diana State Tuberculosis Association from this area over 20 years ago, he had been re-elected to several additional terms and was still a member of the state board.
