Man Ends Life While In Mood of Despondency

George M. Reynolds, 38, World War Veteran, Victim Of Nervous Breakdown.

While in a despondent mood because of ill health and suffering under a severe nervous strain, Geo. M. Reynolds, aged 38, world war veteran, committed suicide about six o'clock Monday morning at his home in Brownstown by shooting himself in the head with a revolver.

His wife and small daughter were asleep in another room at the time. Mrs. Reynolds did not hear the shot but was aroused when her husband fell on the floor. Neighbors were immediately called and he expired a few moments after they reached there without regaining consciousness.

Owing to his ill health he was unable to rest well at night. About 11 o'clock Sunday night he got up and walked the floor much of the time and was undoubtedly suffering a severe mental and nervous strain at the time he committed the act.

Deceased was born in Jackson county August 20, 1895, the son of Frank and Emma Calloway Reynolds, both deceased, and spent his entire life in this county. On April 2, 1921, he was married to Ida Reynolds, who survives. He was a veteran of the World War and was in the service about six months and was a member of Camp Jackson Post 112 of the American Legion. He was a farmer by occupation.

Besides the widow he leaves one daughter, Doris Reynolds, at home, also three brothers and three sisters, Cecil, Roy and Rev. Meade Reynolds and Mrs. J. W. Gollmeier, all of Indianapolis; Mrs. Clarence Gossman and Mrs. Will Schwein, both of Brownstown.

Funeral services in charge of Camp Jackson Post were conducted at the Methodist church this afternoon at 2 o'clock, the Rev. T. J. Hart, pastor, officiating. Burial in Fairview cemetery.
