

Former Local Man Killed Instantly In U. S. 50 Crash

James Reynolds Dies Of Broken Neck When Thrown Into Path Of Over-Turning Car-Driver Seriously Injured.

For the second time in a little more than three years a traffic accident has claimed the life of a member of a Brownstown family.

James Reynoids, a resident of Seymour, and a son of Mrs. Alga Reynoids, of Brownstown, met instant death, and the driver of the car was seriously injured shortly before 9 o'clock Tuesday night in a one-car accident on U. S. Highway 50, a mile and a half west of Seymour.

Robert Burley, age 23, R4, Seymour, the driver, is in the Jackson county hospital, suffering with a possible skull fracture and the possible fracture of a vertebra. His condition, although not considered critical at this time, is serious.

Three years ago last month Reynolds' brother, seventeen-year-old Ronald Reynolds, died in an Indianapolis hospital where he had been in a coma for four months as the result of injuries suffered on July 3, when the automobile in which he was riding collided with a cement mixer truck on U. S. Highway 31, near Edinbigs.

According to State Trooper Robert O. Stanley, the investigating officer assigned to Tuesday night's crash, an alleged eye-witness of the tragedy, who was driving east on the highway, said that Burley, who was traveling west, came upon a slow-moving car, and in an effort to avoid hitting the vehicle, cut his car to the left.

The automobile, a 1956 sedan, went out of control, skidded sidewise to the left of the highway on the south side, rolled over three times, a distance of 250 feet and landed on its top a distance of approximately 75 feet off the highway, in a field belonging to Henry Schneider.

According to Deputy Coroner
Victor L. Burkholder, whose verdict in the case, given late this
morning, is accidental death, Reynolds apparently was thrown from
the automobile as it turned over
the second time, landing in the
path of the car, which passed over
his bedy.

Burley also was thrown from the automobile, but clear of the rolling vehicle.

James Franklin Reynolds was born March 6, 1934, in Washington county, a son of Mrs. Algadan Goodpasture Reynolds, of Brownstown, and the late Orville Reynolds.

He was married on February 9, 1852, at Cortland to Mary Stewart, who survives as does a small son, James Allen Reynolds.

Also surviving are four brothers, Richard Reynolds and Glen Reynolds, of Seymour; Raymond Reynolds, who is serving with the United States Army currently stationed in Germany, and Daymond Reynolds, of Brownstown; and two sisters, Mrs. George Rochner and Mrs. Charles Jackson, of Brownstown.

He was employed at the Seymour Tool & Engineering Company.
