



Charles Robertson Dies After Illness

Funeral services for Charles R. "Charley Buck" Robertson, 67, of 821 W. Spring St., Brownstown, were conducted at 3 p.m. Friday, April 24, from the Brownstown Presbyterian Church with the Rev. Duane Aelick officiating. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery.

He former-ly served as president of the county welfare board, president of the Brownstown School Board, president of the Brownstown Chamber of Commerce, and chairman of the Brownstown Town Board. He was a trustee of the "Doc Joe Fund" of Indiana University. He was a member of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks and Fraternal Order of Eagles.

An active elder in the First Presbyterian Church of Brownstown for more than 20 years, he also served as a deacon and trustee of the church. as a deacon and trustee of the church. In 1960 he was selected as moderator of the New Albany (southern Indiana) Presbytery and was leader of the National Council of Presbyterian Men. He was a member of the Presbyterian Synod of Indiana and was elected as a delegate to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church.

Robertson became associated with the Robertson Corporation (then call-ed Ewing Mill Co.) in 1935 and has served the corporation in just about every capacity during his lifelong tenure with the company. The Robert-sons acquired the Lemon Mill in Bedford in 1938 and the Farmers Hominy Mill in Seymour in 1944. They also have owned and operated grain elevators in Bloomington and Jeffer-sonville.
