OTHER DEATHS OF PAST WEEK

Another of Brownstown's well-known citizens was suddenly called by death, Tuesday, when E. S. Robertson passed away about 5:30 o'clock a. m.

Deceased had been in failing health for some time, but was able to be about and attended to his work. He appeared in usual health Monday, and made no complaint at the time he retired. At a late hour some of the members of the family returned home from attending the Masonic banquet and Mr. and Mrs. Robertson partook of some cream and cake which they brought with them. Tuesday morning Mrs. Robertson arose first, and while she was combing her hair in an adjoining room, she heard her husband moan. She called to him, and receiving no reply, went to his room and saw that he was breathing his last. Other members were called and Dr. Cummings was sent for, but Mr. Robertson expired before he reached there.

He was a son of John B. and Mary E. (Wayman) Robertson and was born on the Robertson homestead about a mile west of Brownstown, where he has practically spent his entire life, October 12, 1854. He was united in marriage to Miss Mary Stanley, of Campbellsburg, October 11, 1879. To their union were born nine children, of whom eight, Frank S., Lynn and Miss Edna, who live at home; Mrs. H. R. Cross and Wayne Robertson, of Winchester, Ind.; Mrs. H. R. Noe, of Three Rivers, Mich.; Ray Robertson, of Lafayette and Roy Robertson, of South Bend, with their mother, survive him. He also leaves three grandchildren. One son, Ferris, preceded him to the grave about two years ago. He also leaves four brothers, Jonathan and R. L. Robertson, of Brownstown; Willard Robertson, of Indianapolis, and Bruce Robertson, of Cortland. Just thirteen years to the day that Mr. Robertson died, his only sister, Mrs. W. R. Bolles, passed away and his brother, Chas. A. Robertson, died just thirteen days ago.

On August 1, 1914, he was appointed postmaster of the Ewing postoffice and was serving in that capacity at the time of his death. He was of a quiet, unassuming disposition and liked by all for his kind heart, cheerful disposition and honest straightforward disposition.

Funeral services were held at the Christian church, of which he was a member, this afternoon at 4:30 o'clock (Continued To Page Four.)
