He attend-ed the Brownstown schools, graduating in 1965, after which he took a mechani-cal course at Purdue University, gradu-ating therefrom in 1911. For a number of years past he has been employed as a traveling salesman for the Davison Tool and Manufactur-ing Company, of New York, and stood next to the highest as one of their most capable salesmen. He was united in marriage December 12, 1920, to Miss Blanche Reynolds, who with one daughter, Alice, survive him. He also leaves his parents, four broth-ers and two sisters, viz: Will and John of Memphis, Tenn., Ed. of Franklin, Howard, Pearl and Blanche, of this place.
