In Memoriam.

Mrs. Rachel Bolles, nee Robertson, was born near Brownstown, Jackson county, Ind., September 18, 1852, and departed this life September 9, 1906.

She was the only daughter of John Blaze and Mary Elizabeth Robertson, who preceded her to the grave several years ago. In early youth she gave her heart to the Lord and united with the Christian church, afterwards uniting with the Presbyterian church at Brownstown, in which connection she fell asleep in Jesus.

She was united in marriage to Wm. Riley Bolles, October 18, 1870. To this union were born two children, one son—Charles Andrew, and one daughter—Mrs. Myrtle Clare Applewhite, whom she leaves with her husband and one little grandson, James Riley Applewhite, to mourn her absence.

She lived a consistent christian life, which was an example worthy of imitation. Always in her place in christian duty when her physical condition and other providential circumstances would permit. She was always glad when the time came and the privilege was hers to "Go into the house of the Lord, to behold the beauty of the Lord and inquire in His temple." The 23rd Psalm was a portion of the scriptures

that seemed always to bring comfort to her heart in time of trouble. Truly she viewed the Lord as her Shepard, who would not forsake her in trouble, nor leave her hungry and thirsty, nor when she came to walk through the valley of the shadow of death. With this portion of the blessed word, she would endeavor to comfort her friends and loved ones when in trouble. Her gentle bearing, her kind and tender sympathizing nature, her ever happy smile and bright face shed a ray of sunlight upon all whom she met. Even in her last sickness, at times she would seem to forget her own sufferings in her concern for the comfort of those around her. She was a devoted wife, a kind, gentle, loving mother, a self-sacrificing, sympathizing neighbor. She leaves a vacancy not only felt by the sorrowing ones in the home, and truly this is great, but by the whole community; by the Ladies' Aid and Ladies' Missionary Societies of which she was an active and zealous member, and by the whole Presbyterian church, of which she was a valued member.

Since it is the will of our Heavenly Father to take from us this dear child of His, to remove her from the sorrows and trials of earth to the joys of heaven and from her sufferings to her rest above, we look up into the face of Him who doeth all things well and say: "Even so Father for so it seemed good in thy sight."
