Mr. Vanover Expires Here Aged 94

Was One of the Oldest Citizens
of Jackson County--Born
In Kentucky.

Civil War Veteran

Lived In Brownstown For 57 Years
---General Infirmities and Flu
Cause of Death.

Andrew M. Vanover, Civil War veteran, well-known over the county, died Sunday morning at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Chas. Wayman, near Brownstown, with whom he had made his home for the past two years. He was one of the oldest, if not the oldest man in Jackson county. Death was due to general infirmities. He had been able to be about most of the time but he suffered an attack of the flu on Christmas day and had been confined to his bed since that time.

Mr. Vanover was born in Louisville, Ky., July 9, 1838. On September 1, 1857, he was married in Scott county to Mrs. Cynthia Ferrin. To this union were born one son and nine daughters. On August 12, 1862, he enlisted in the Civil War in Company H, 66th Regiment Volunteers for a period of three years. He had only served ninety days when he was wounded - and was honorably discharged November 29, 1862.

In 1876 Mr. Vanover and family moved to Brownstown from Scott county, where he lived continuously until his death. His wife preceded (Continued to Page Five)

him in death December, 1921. For a number of years he was engaged in farming and was also a teamster. He was a member of the Baptist church.

Besides Mrs. Wayman he leaves two other daughters, Mrs. Adolph Herrmann, of Indianapolis; Mrs. Edna Wilhite, of Temperance, Michigan; eleven grandchildren, ten great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild. He also leaves one nephew, Joe Raybourn, of Orleans, and one niece, Mrs. Eva Dorn, of New Albany.

Funeral services were held at his late home Tuesday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock, the Rev. E. E. Pedicord officiating. Burial in Fairview cemetery. Military services were conducted by Camp Jackson Post of the American Legion Post at Brownstown.
