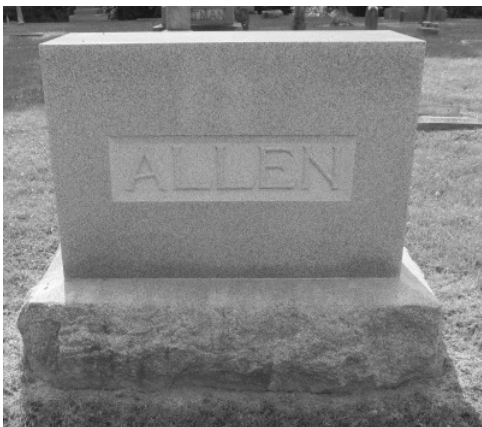

Mrs. James W. Allen, of Brownstown Dies After Brief
Illness.

ALLEN—Mrs. James W. Allen, one of Brownstown's highly respected ladies, died at her home on Walnut street Saturday evening, March 11, 1916, at six o'clock after a week's illness of pneumonia, age 76 years, 6 months and 17 days. Her death came as a shock to many of her relatives and friends, as only a few knew that she was sick.

Hannah Minerva Ogden was born near Madison, Jefferson county, August 25, 1839. She was united in marriage to James W. Allen at Austin, Scott county, May 22, 1856. For several years they resided at Crothersville and came to Brownstown in 1864. In 1865 Mr. Allen was elected Recorder of Jackson county and served in that capacity eight years. For a while they lived at Sygo afterward moving to Brownstown where she lived continuously until her death. To their union were born nine children of whom eight survive her, viz: Mel, Sherman, Clarence, Misses Ella and Lee of this place; Will, of Washington; Mrs. Anna McKain, of Indianapolis, and Mrs. Rose Jackson, of near Freetown. She also leaves 13 grandchildren, two great-grandchildren and four brothers, Sylvester and Oscar Ogden, of Louisville; W. E. Ogden, of Jeffersonville, and Ed Ogden, of St. Louis. Her husband preceded her to the grave in June, 1899.

Deceased united with the Methodist church about twenty years ago under the pastorate of Rev. Thompson and lived a member thereof until death. She was a woman of many excellent traits of character, a kind neighbor and a sympathizing friend. Her whole life was centered in her family, who will sadly miss the watchful care and devotion of a good mother.

The funeral services were conducted at the M. E. church Monday afternoon at one o'clock (by Rev. A. F. Hogan, after which the remains were laid to rest in Fairview cemetery.
