## Barkman Rites Held Saturday

Funeral services for William C. Barkman, age fifty-four, a former Brownstown resident, were conducted at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon from the home of his brother, Charles H. Barkman, in Brownstown, with the Rev. William L. Richmond, pastor of the Brownstown Christian Church, in charge. Buñal was in Fairview Cemetery, Brownstown. Mr. Barkman died October 18 at Rockford, Ill. Death occurred suddenly and was due to a heart attack.
