

Frank Brodhecker, aged 67, whose lingering illness has been mentioned from time to time, breathed his last at his home in Brownstown this morning at 6:30 o'clock.

About six years ago he suffered a stroke of paralysis, from, which he never fully recovered. Later he had another stroke, which left him almost helpless, but he was able to get around until about seven months ago since which time he has been confined to the house.

Deceased was a life-long resident of this locality, being born about two miles east of Brownstown. He was a son of Conrad and Anna C. (Heller) Brodhecker, deceased.

When a young man he taught school for four years, and in January, 1879, was appointed deputy county treasurer, in which capacity he served for twelve years, under the terms of H. W. Wacker, Henry Kleinmeyer and Adam Heller, after which he was elected to the office, serving from 1889 to 1893.

A few years after his retirement from public office he engaged in the hardware business for several years, after which he followed clerical work and book-keeping in various capaci-
