DR. C. L. WILSON EXPIRES SUDDENLY THIS MORNING

Dies About Two O'Clock—Had Been Sick Since December 16 But Seemed To Be Improving.

OTHER DEATHS THE PAST WEEK

The death of Dr. C. L. Wilson, one of the best known residents of Brownstown and Jackson county, occurred at his home this morning about two o'clock of angina pectoris.

Although he had been confined to his bed since December 16, his death came as a shock to his friends and neighbors when they learned that he had passed away suddenly. He had been lying on his left side, which causes much pain for one suffering with swelling of the heart, and from the fact that it did not hurt, remarked that he would be able to get up in the morning for a little while. He told Mrs. Wilson to lie down and get some sleep. She had scarcely dozed off until he called her to turn him over quick and he died almost immediately after being turned on his other side.

Dr. Wilson was the son of Preston and Julia Wilson, both deceased, and was born in Jefferson county May 15, 1854. After graduating from the common schools he taught school in Jefferson county several years. He attended Moores Hill college, where he graduated and then entered medical college at Louisville and after his graduation from that institution he went to Deputy, Ind., where he practiced his profession a short time. He located in Brownstown April 28, 1891, where he built up a large practice both here and throughout the county. At the age of seventeen he united with the Methodist church at his old home in Jefferson county. He was a member of Brownstown Lodge, No. 60, K. of P. He was a man of strong convictions and fearlessly expressed them no matter what the environment. In politics he was a staunch Democrat. He was a great lover of dumb animals and never could stand to see one abused. He was a good husband and a kind, obliging neighbor.

He was united in marriage to Miss Alice Johnson at North Vernon May 25, 1890, who survives him. He also leaves one brother, Walter Wilson, of Jeffersonville, and two sisters, Mrs. Mattie Glendenning, of Louisville, and Mrs. John Norman, of Missouri.

Funeral services, under the auspices of the Knights of Pythias, will be held at the Methodist church Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock, Rev. T. Garland Smith, officiating. Burial in
