

Dr. W. K. Adair, C'ville Physician More Than Fifty Years, Succumbs

Dr. William K. Adair, who was a practicing physician in Crothersville for more than fitty years and widely known in the medical profession throughout all of Indiana, died at his home, 208 South Armstrong street, in Crothersville, late last Friday morning.

He had had a heart history for several years and had been in failing health since April 12.

A second generation physician,
Dr. Adair was a son of the late
Dr. and Mrs. Samuel Lowery
Adair, and was born in New
Washington, December 1, 1882.
His father was a well-known
practicing physician in that areafor many years.

A graduate of the University of Louisville, Dr. Adair practiced briefly at New Washington, then in Campbellsburg and for the past fifty-eight years was a practicing physician in Crothersville.

He also was a member of the medical staff of the Jackson County Schneck Memorial Hospital.

In October of 1960 he was honored for fifty years of service at the Indiana State Medical Association's 111th annual convention in French Lick. At that time he was presented a certificate of distinction and a gold lapel pin and was initiated into the "50-Year Club."

The Certificate of Distinction points out that Dr. Adair "through his proficient and untiring ministry of the science of healing, did honor to his God, his community, his profession and himself," and recognizes his "unselfish devotion to his patients and his loyalty to the medical profession."

Dr. Adair also was honored several years ago by the Crothersyille Lions Club and given a plaque, made by Elmo Brinder, of Crothersville.

During his years in Crothersville Dr. Adair was identified prominently in all programs for the town's growth and development. He was a member of the Chamber of Commerce and a fifty-year member of the Crothersville Masonic Lodge. He was a World War I veteran, a member of the Jackson-Jennings County Medical Association, the Indiana Medical Association and the American Medical Association and the American Medical Association.

On June 14, 1925, he was married at Jeffersonville, to the former Miss Inez Ahl, of Seymour, who survives.

Funeral rites were Monday afternoon from the Crothersville Baptist Church, in charge of the pastor, the Rev. Mike Fink. Interment was in Fairview Cemetery, in Brownstown.
