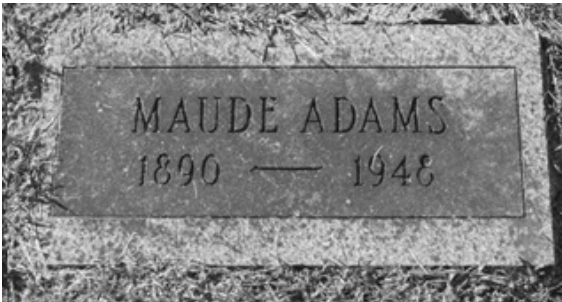

## County Native Killed By Truck

### Mrs. Maude Adams, Of Louisville, Is Victim— Rites At Brownstown

Killed when a truck backing out of an alley on Fourth street, north of Oak, in Louisville, ran over her, Mrs. Maude Adams, 58, of Louisville, a native of Brownstown, met death shortly after noon Thursday.

Funeral services are to be conducted at 2 o'clock this afternoon at the Winklepleck Funeral Home in Brownstown, with the Rev. Russell Hall, pastor of the Brownstown Methodist Church, in charge. Burial in Fairview Cemetery, at Brownstown.

Mrs. Adams, who was born in Brownstown April 1, 1890, the daughter of Riley and Mary Nowling Shelton, is survived by the husband, Edgar R. Adams, whom she married in Indianapolis on April 22, 1919, and one brother, Clyde Shelton, of Brownstown. She spent her early life in Brownstown, moving from there to Indianapolis and later to Louisville.

According to Coroner Joseph Beck, of Louisville, Mrs. Adams' skull was crushed by the rear wheels of the truck.

Residing at 502 West St. Catherine street, Mrs. Adams was believed to have been walking on a narrow sidewalk adjacent to an A. & P. store. The driver of the truck, James R. Kelly, 23, also of Louisville, said he had been unloading soft drinks at the store and was backing up to allow another truck to pass, according to Patrolman Joe Graves, of Louisville, who investigated.

Kelly, whose truck was facing west, said he did not know he had struck anyone until an unidentified person called, "You ran over a woman." The passer-by apparently the only witness to the accident, could not be located later.

An employe of the High Rock Ginger Ale Company, in Louisville, Kelly was charged with reckless driving and manslaughter. Mrs. Adams' death was the 26th traffic fatality in Louisville this year, contrasting with 16 during the same period last year.

Neighbors of Mrs. Adams said she had gone to the Fourth-and-Oak area to shop. Her husband, an electric appliance salesman, was in Madison on business when the accident occurred.
