

## Wm. C. Ball Passes Away EarlyMonday

Funeral Services Held This
Afternoon At Christian
Church.

Ill Only Few Weeks
Had Been Active In Lumber Business Here More Than
Fifty Years.

William C. Ball, age 74, another of Brownstown's prominent business men thas passed to his reward.

Mr. Ball died at the Methodist hospital, Indianapolis, where he had been n taking treatment the past three weeks, d Monfay morning, July 22, at 1:45 o'clock. He had been ill for mise weeks with a complication of diseases from which pneumonia developed, resisting in his death.

Funeral services were conducted at the Christian church this afternoon ds at 2:30 o'clock with the Rev. O. S. ad Brooke and the Rev. William L. Rich-

mond, pastor, in charge. Burial in Fairview cemetery.

Mr. Ball, son of James A. and Eliza
Ann Baird Ball, was born at Dupont,
Indiana. September 27, 1865. Later
the family moved to Madison and when

age they came to  $Brownstown_{sf}$  where Mr. Ball has since resided.

On July 25, 1886, he was married in Brownstown to Miss Eliza Alice Humphrey, who survives. They celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in 1936.

Mr. Ball received his educational training in the public schools after which he served an apprenticeship under his father and became a thoroughly skilled carpenter and builder. He continued to be associated with his father in contracting and building until 1892, since which time he has continued operations independently. At the time of his death Mr. Ball was the oldest active lumber dealer in Indiana. He was in business over fifty in Brownstown.

Deceased was a man of many loyal friendships and had the very high respect of scores of people. He was honorable and upright, of a friendly nature and much devoted to his home and family. He was a member of the Christian church and was superintendent of the Sunday school in his younger years. He was a deacon and trustee of the church, serving as a trustee for the past forty years.

Survivors besides the widow are three sons and four daughters: Clarence, who was associated with his father in business; Kenneth and Dr. Charles L. Ball, Mrs. George H. Conner, all of Brownstown; Misses Stella Esther and Grace Ball, at home; two brothers, E. B. Ball, of Indianapolis, and Gilbert Ball, of Brownstown; seven grandchildren and one great-grandchild. One son, Dr. Leon Ball preceded him in death a few years ago.
