Mrs. Lillie Burrell, Aged Local Resident, Buried Sunday

Funeral rites were held Sunday afternoon from the First Baptist Church, here, for Mrs. Lillie Burrell, 81, who died early Thursday morning at her home. She had been in failing health for the past nine months.

The Rev. William F. Bateman, First Baptist pastor, was in charge of the service. Interment was in Fairview Cemetery.

Born in Washington county, January 18, 1878, Mrs. Burrell was a daughter of the late Umrey and Sumantha J. Fleanor Bryant. The early part of her married life was spent in Driftwood township and for the past half-century she had lived in Brownstown.

She was twice married. Her first marriage on February 12, 1895, was to Daniel Boley, and following his death, on September 13, 1911, she was married to Hugh T. Burrell.

She was the mother of ten children, five sons and five daughters. Eight survive. They are Harry Boley, Cincinnati, Ohio; William Boley, Brownstown justice of the peace; John Burrell, East St. Louis, Missouri; Frank Burrell, Columbus; Mrs. Esther Schwein and Mrs. Wiley H. Phillips, Brownstown; Mrs. Glen Thompson, Seymour, and Mrs. Wilmer Wolf, Medora.

A son, Ed E. Boley, former Brownstown town marshal, and a daughter, Minnie Boley, are deceased.

She also leaves a brother, Henry Bryant, Pence, Indiana; two half-brothers, Millard Bryant, Austin, and Randall Bryant, Attica; three sisters, Mrs. Frank Hensley and Mrs. George Grove, of Scottsburg, and Mrs. Martin Hensley, Williamsport, and a half-sister, Mrs. Inez Quill, of Indianapolis.

Also surviving are 22 grandchildren, 28 great-grandchildren and one great-great grandchild.

Mrs. Burrell was a member of Brownstown First Baptist Church, Brownstown Chapter, Order of Eastern Star and the Auxiliary to Post No. 7755, Veteran of Foreign Wars.

During her long life in Brownstown she made many friends.
