

Mrs. Guy Robertson Dies Following Operation-Other Deaths During the Past Week.

Early-Mrs. Virginia Early, widow of Newton Early, passed away at her home in Brownstown Saturday evening at 5:30 o'clock, aged 74 years, 6

months and 15 days.

A week ago Friday night she attended the revival meeting at the Methodist church and returned to her home about nine o'clock. Soon after reaching her home she suffered a paralytic stroke and fell just outside of her door, where she was found in an unconscious condition Saturday morning about six o'clock. All that medical aid could do was done for her, but she never fully regained

consciousness.

She was educated in the public schools of Brownstown and was one of five girls who attended the old DePauw Female College when it was located at New Albany, whose friendship endured through girlhood, young womanhood and all through their married life, ever keeping in close touch with each other.
