DEATH RECORD.

ENDEBROCK—Henry H. F. Endebrock, one of the most highly respected citizens of Grassy Fork township, died at his home near Tampico, Friday July 27, 1900, aged 69 years, 10 months and 13 days. Although he had not been in good health for some years, yet his ailments was not serious, until about a week ago when he had an attack of cholera morbus which resulted in inflammation of the stomach and bowels and caused his death. The funeral cortege left the family residence at 1 o'clock Sunday afternoon and wended its way to Brownstown, where services were conducted in the Presbyterian church, Rev. S. C. Bates officiating, after which the remains were laid to rest in Fairview cemetery. Deceased was born at Huntenborough, Province of Hanover, Germany, September 14, 1830. He came to Jackson county at the age of 15 years with his parents who located near Sauers church. He made his home at Dr. Wirt's at Brownstown while Judge Otto was presiding Judge here, about which time his parents moved to the farm now owned by Cyrus D. Crabb, about four miles east of Brownstown, from which place they moved to Grassy Fork township, where he has since resided.

He was united in marriage to Susan P. DeWyke, October 23, 1861, to which union were born six children, three of whom preceded him to the grave, while the three others—William H., Lonisa and Albert H.—with their widowed mother survived him.

Mr. Endebrock was an honest and conscientious man, of a rather jovial disposition and strived to please every body. He asked for no political or social position but rather preferred retirement and was a lover of home and did his duty as a husband and father. He worshiped his children and took great pride in their education and advancement. He was for several years a member of the Presbyterian church. His work on earth is done and may he receive the reward that awaits him for his faithful labor while on earth.

The family have the sympathy of a large circle of friends and acquaintances in their bereavement.
