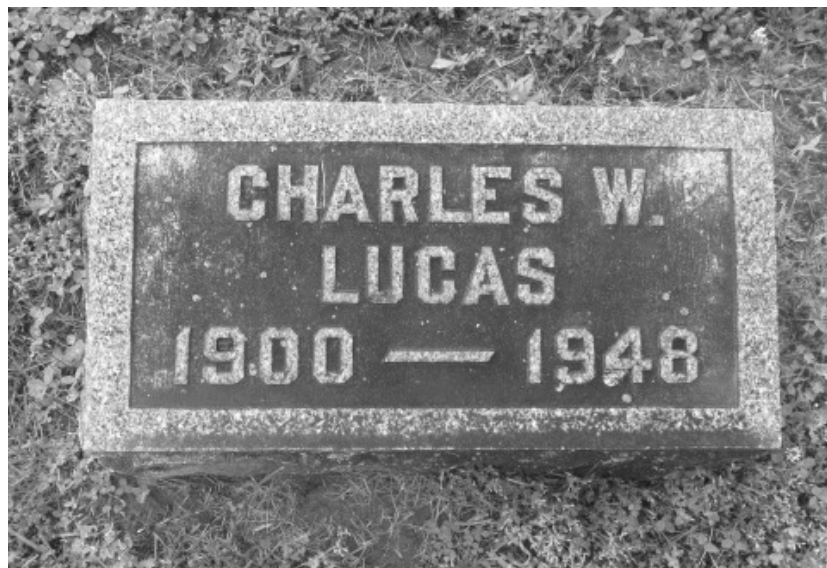

Charles W. Lucas Dies At Home In Brownstown

**Prominent Business Man
Falls Victim To Long
Suffered Heart Ail-
ment.**

People of Brownstown and vicinity were saddened and shocked Monday morning upon learning of the death at 1:15 a. m., of Charles W. Lucas, 47, a lifelong resident of Brownstown, who passed away from a stroke which followed an illness of several months from a heart ailment.

Although Mr. Lucas had been under treatment for some time he had continued to carry on his work as manager of the Lucas Feed Store and Hatchery and had met friends everywhere with his customary ready good nature. His illness took a turn for the worse a week ago and confined him to his bed.

Under a forceful exterior, Charley, as he was best known, car-

ried the warmth of kindness and sincerity which won him a wide circle of friends.

As a member of the Indiana Poultry Association in line with his chosen business as a hatcheryman, Mr. Lucas was selected as a member of the state executive committee on which he served two years. In 1946 he was made a director at the state meeting and as such served on the state executive board.

In community affairs, Mr. Lucas was a member of the Brownstown Chamber of Commerce and was an active member of the Methodist church of Brownstown. He was a member of Washington Lodge No. 13, F & A. M., of Brownstown and of the Scottish Rite of Indianapolis. As a Mason his work carried him through the degrees of Seymour Chapter No. 85, Royal Arch Masons; Seymour Council No. 38, Royal and Select Masters; and Seymour Commandery No. 56, Knights Templar.

Mr. Lucas was born near Pleasant Grove October 27, 1900, the son of S. Henry and Anna Klewitz Lucas. When a small child the family moved to Brownstown. He was married in Brownstown April 30, 1922, to Miss Ida Lee McKain, who survives.

Survivors besides the father and widow are three daughters and a son, Miss Virginia Mae and James A. Lucas, both at home; Mrs. Werner Dickinson, of Grafenwohr, Germany; Mrs. Robert Sage, of Hollywood, Calif. One brother, Harry Lucas, of Brownstown, and two sisters, Mrs. C. G. Brodhecker, of New York City, New York, and Mrs. Thomas Cordrey, of Brownstown.

Funeral services were conducted at the Brownstown Methodist church this afternoon at 2 o'clock with the Rev. Russell Hall, pastor in charge. Burial in Fairview cemetery.
