## Killed In Auto Accident

Hamlin Scott, Formerly Of  
Brownstown, Killed Instant-  
ly At Shelbyville.

## Car Struck By Train

Remains To Be Brought Here  
For Burial--Son Of Mr. And  
Mrs. Henry Scott.

Hamlin Smith Scott, 43, of Indian-  
apolis, who was born and reared in  
Brownstown, was one of two men  
who were killed in an automobile ac-  
cident, which occurred about four  
o'clock Monday evening at a rail-  
road crossing about three miles  
southeast of Shelbyville.

The other man was Charles Delt-  
zer, 38, of Shelbyville.

While complete details of the ac-  
cident have not been received here  
a press dispatch from Shelbyville  
states that residents near the scene  
of the accident said they saw two  
cars, one driven by Scott, approach  
the crossing side by side, and one  
sped across the tracks just ahead of  
the train; Scott's machine was struck  
by the engine.

The men had been canvassing  
rural residents of Shelby county for  
several weeks in connection with the  
purchase of a fire truck to be used for  
fighting farm fires, and they were  
nearing completion of their work  
when Monday's accident occurred.  
Scott was a salesman for a company  
manufacturing fire apparatus and  
other municipal equipment.

Deltzer formerly was manager of a  
clothing store at Shelbyville and had  
operated a filling station. The widow,  
one child and two sisters survive.

"Ham", as he was familiarly known  
here, was born in Brownstown No-  
vember 18, 1890, the son of Mr. and  
Mrs. Henry Scott. He moved to In-  
dianapolis with his parents when he  
was eleven years old, where he had  
since resided. His father died a  
number of years ago. His father was  
for many years proprietor of the  
Aetna Hotel in Brownstown.

He is survived by his mother and  
four sisters, Mrs. Chas. A. Bolles, of  
Brownstown; Mrs. F. H. Cheyne and  
Mrs. Loraine Osborne, both of Indi-

anapolis, and Mrs. William McKee, of  
Houston, Texas.

Funeral services will be held at the  
Kregelo & Bailey undertaking estab-  
lishment in Indianapolis Thursday  
morning at 10 o'clock. The body will  
be brought to Brownstown and taken  
direct to Fairview cemetery. The  
casket will be opened at the cemetery  
and the funeral party will probably  
arrive here about 2 o'clock.
