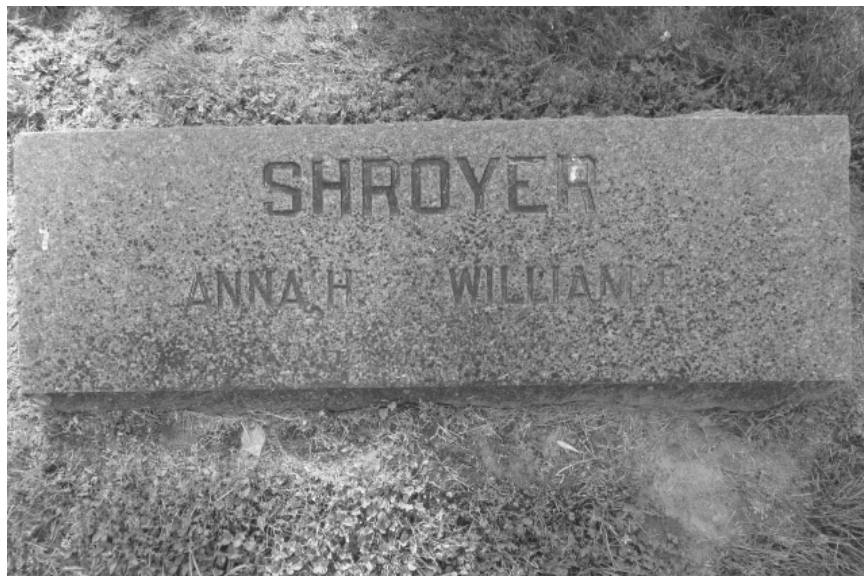

Wife Follows Husband In Death

Mrs. Anna Shroyer, Brownstown, Expires Suddenly Sunday Morning--Other Deaths.

Within less than a week after the death of William C. Shroyer, his wife, Mrs. Anna Hackendorf Shroyer, age 72, followed him in death. She died suddenly of heart trouble at her home in Brownstown about 5:30 o'clock Sunday morning, February 16. Her husband died just six days before.



Mrs. Schroyer had been in poor health for some time, but was able to be up and to attend to her household duties. She seemed to be as well as usual Saturday. However, she was subject to heart attacks, and possibly the shock of her husband's death may have affected her heart condition in her illness.

About four o'clock Sunday morning Mrs. Shroyer awakened Miss Blanche McMillan, who had been staying with her since her husband's death, and remarked that she could hardly breathe and that she thought she was going to have a heart attack. A physician was called, but she did not revive and passed away about 5:30 o'clock.

Anna Hackendorf was the eldest child of Martin and Mary Elizabeth Peters Hackendorf, deceased. She was born December 12, 1863, on the same lot where she died and spent her entire life. She was married to Wm. C. Shroyer November 26, 1903.

She was a member of the first graduating class of the Brownstown schools, having graduated in 1881, and was the last surviving member of a class of four. She possessed unusual mentality, and her quick grasp and broad comprehension made her peculiarly fitted for the career that she chose, that of a public school teacher, and for twelve years she was one of the county's most efficient teachers.

In January, 1881, she united with the Methodist church and was one of its most devout and active members. She taught a class in the Sunday school for many years and at the time of her death, was the teacher of the Women's Bible class. She was a charter member of the Epworth League and one of its first officers. She was also a member of the Foreign Missionary Society, the Ladies Aid and really functioned in all departments of church work.
