

## Ray Vermilya Dies Of Heart Ailment Thurs.

Was Retired Railway Postal Mail Clerk---Funeral Services Held Saturday.

A pall of gloom spread over Brownstown Thursday night when it was learned that Ray Vermilya had passed away. He seemed in his usual health on Sunday and with his family had spent the day at Vincennes with Mrs. Vermilya's brother, W. M. Welsh, and family. On Monday morning he suffered a heart attack and another one Tuesday afternoon which confined him to his bed and he gradually grew worse until his death Thursday night at 10:15 o'clock.
