

WAYMAN—Edmond J. Wayman, of Brownstown's esteemed citizens, died at the home of his son, Chas. P. Wayman, about a mile west of Brownstown, Sunday morning, March 5, 1911, of infirmities of old age. Deceased had been in poor health for some time but had only been confined to his bed since Friday. His twin sister, Mrs. Sarah Ann Ewing, died November 4, 1910.

Deceased was born in Washington county, Indiana, February 20, 1835, and at the time of his death was 76 years and 13 days of age. At the age of two years he with his parents moved: to Jackson county and located on the Lafe Robertson farm in the Pleasant Grove neighborhood, where he lived until he was 13 years of age when he moved to Brownstown, where he has since resided. On January 10, 1856, he was united in marriage to Miss America Weathers and to their union were born four children, of whom one som Chas. Wayman, survives him. His wife preceded him to the grave July 5. 1907.

Mr. Wayman was of a quiet disposition. His devotion to his family and kindness to everybody will long linger in the memory of all who knew him: He was very fond of children and many a time when he used to drive to the farm, his wagon would be filled with little boys, who were always eager to go with him. His hand was never weary, his step never failed in caring for and ministering to those who were in any way dependent upon him. Since the death of his wife he had made his home with his son. Besides his son he leaves seven grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Deceased was a member of the Christian church. The funerel services were conducted at the residence Tuesday afternoon at two o'clock, Eld. Chas. E. Scifers, of Little York, officiating, after which the remains were laid to rest in Fairview cemetery.
