After an illness of less than six days of pneumonia fevery Oregon Wray, of Owen township, one of the most successful and highly respected

farmer of Jackson county, died last
Wednesday, at 12 o'clock
The fact that he was ill was not
generally known and the news of his death came as a distinct shock to his host of friends throughout the coun-

ty.

Oregon Wray, son of Vandiver and Martha Wray, was born January 1, 1842, on a farm in Owen township, Jackson county, within two miles of the site of the Wray homestead, where he had spent more than halt a century of a long and useful life.

He died October 2, 1918, at the age of 76 years, 9 months and 1 day.

All of his early life was spent in Owen township. He was married December 18, 1861, to Susanna Sut ton. They celebrated their 56th wedding anniversary December 18, last year
