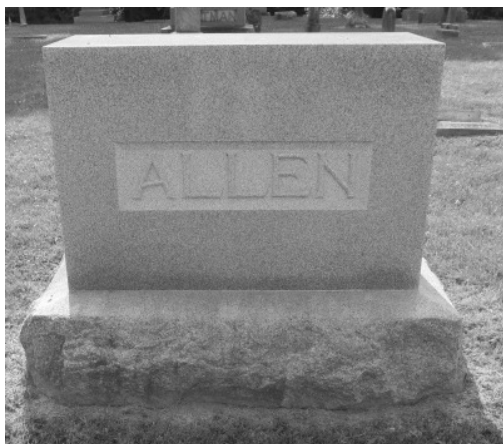

Brownstown Banker Passes Away After Six Days' Illness

FUNERAL IS TUESDAY

Rites At Methodist Church At 2 O'clock—Burial In The Brownstown Cemetery

Charles M. Allen, age 71, president of the Citizen's State Bank at Ewing since its organization twenty-one year ago, died at his home in Brownstown Sunday noon. He was stricken with influenza six days ago, which resulted in his death.

Funeral services will be held at the Methodist church at Brownstown at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon in charge of the Rev. L. S. Lovell and burial will be made in the cemetery at Brownstown.

Mr. Allen was born and reared in Jackson county and for the past sixty years had made his home in Brownstown. On November 9, 1882, he was united in marriage to Miss Ida Harris Whitson at Austin. The two made their home at the county seat where they made for themselves by their splendid characters and attractive personalities a place high in the regard of the community. Mrs. Allen passed away on July 25, 1917.

Previous to the time he became president of the Citizen's State Bank Mr. Allen was associated with the Bolles Hardware firm at Brownstown. Twenty-one years ago the Citizen's State Bank was organized and Mr. Allen was elected its president. He remained at the helm of the institution for twenty-one years and during that time saw its steady growth under his guidance.

Two daughters, Mrs. Mabel Allen Parker, of Brownstown, and Miss Katherine Allen, of Brownstown, survive with two brothers of the deceased, Wilbur W. Allen, of Washington, D. C., and Sherman Allen, of Brownstown. Four sisters also survive, Mrs. Rose Jackson, of Freetown; Mrs. Anna McKain, of Brownstown; Miss Ella Allen, of Brownstown, and Mrs. Lee McCov, of Brownstown.

Mr. Allen was a member of the Methodist church at Brownstown and was also affiliated with the Masonic and Knights of Pythias lodges. The Masons will have charge of rites at the church funeral service.
