Death of a Good Young Man.

Edward Ireland, a son of James and Catharine Ireland, both deceased, died at the family residence in this place on Sunday morning at five o'clock. He was taken sick about two weeks previously with malarial fever, and al-though he seemed very ill, no appre-hension of a fatal termination was felt until the day before his death, when a change for the worse took place and it became manifest that he was rapidly declining. He remained conscious to the end, and conversed rationally with his brothers and sisters and others until within a few moments before the breath of life departed from him. Among those at his bed-side when his spirit took its flight were Rev. Thos. Harrison and Prof. C.*L. Hottel. He Harrison and Prof. C. L. Hottel. He was a pupil in the High School, and was greatly attached to Mr. Hottel. He expressed great regard for the school, and hoped it might be harmonious and successful. He was born in Brownstown October 28th, 1866, and was aged 17 years, 11 months and 14 days.

Edward Ireland was a bright and promising young man. He was animated by a desire to live a life of usefulness, respirits and honor. He had a

fulness, probity and honor. He had a high regard for Churches and Sunday Schools and was one of the most regular attendants at the M. E. Sunday School and almost as regular at Church. He shunned wicked ways and evil companionship. As a pupil at school he was attentive, faithful and studious.

His funeral took place on Tuesday morning and was largely attended. The casket containing his body was taken to the M. E. Church, where Rev. Thos. Harrison preached an impressive sermon from St. John xi, 23. Prof. Hottel, the Principal, and the pupils of the High School attended the funeral in a body, bearing with them a number of most beautifully wrought floral and evergreen offerings, one of which represented an open book. The deceased was held in high esteem by the pupils of the High School, who, as expressive of their love for him and sorrow at his untimely death, passed
