
## Willard L. Miller



A Brownstown man died Tuesday night

Miller and his wife were westbound on U.S. 50 at 4 p. m. Tuesday. A car driven by Mary B. Wright, 27, of 320 W. Walnut St., Brownstown, was eastbound on the

swerved off U.S. 50 and then came back on to the road. The truck flipped four times and Miller was thrown from the

Truck. Miller was taken by ambulance to Jackson County Schneck Memorial Hos-pital. Later he was transported by ambulance to Indiana University Medical Center at Indianapolis. While near Columbus on Interstate 65, Miller died. He was taken to Bartholomew County He was taken to Bartholomew County Lela Miller, 57, his wife, was taken to the Seymour hospital with a fractured left shoulder, six broken ribs and broken

left shoulder, six broken ribs and broken right foot, the officer reported. She was admitted Tuesday. Hospital officials listed her in stable condition today. Mary Wright, the driver of the car, was taken by ambulance to the Seymour hos-pital with multiple puncture wounds in her left arm and a sprained right ankle. She complained of pains in the hip and was admitted to the hospital. Officials at the hospital asid she was in satisfactory condition this morning. condition this morning.

Both vehicles received extensive damage. Mr. Miller was the sixth person to die

in a traffic accident in Jackson County in 1978. A year ago on this date, 11 persons had died in traffic mishaps. Assisting Indiana State Police were
